

FY 2023-2024 Giving Opportunities with SCICU

Scholars Programs - Businesses and charitable organizations are encouraged to invest in student scholars at SCICU's 21 member institutions through programs they customize based on academic achievement, major area of study, financial need, or leadership.

Undergraduate Student/Faculty Research Program - In its third decade, this program funds research projects conducted by undergraduate students under faculty mentorship. The program gives students a taste of graduate-level research – from submission of proposals for competitive funding review to professional research symposium presentation of findings.

Student Lifeline Grants Program - Lifeline Grants help SCICU students persevere through financial crises, stay in school, and complete their degree. Campus financial aid directors select grant recipients who are identified as at-risk for dropping out.

Public Policy Update for SCICU Board Meeting – October 10, 2024

Thankfully all of SCICU's priorities were included in the budget passed for the state's fiscal year 2024-25, including:

- 1. Tuition Grants Commission is retaining \$20 million in lottery revenue.
- 2. CHE Needs-Based Program is retaining its lottery revenue of \$80 million. NOTE: The Tuition Grants Program gets about 15% of that, based on enrollment.
- 3. Merit Scholarships are fully funded at \$286 million in lottery revenue.
- 4. PASCAL is fully funded at \$1.5 million in lottery revenue.

In addition to this state budget support, SCICU member institutions are now included in the Nursing Graduate Scholarships Program. Up to \$90,000 in tuition reimbursement is available for each student who pursues graduate-level nursing educator credentials at four of

our institutions that offer eligible nursing educator programs.

There's more good news. Palmetto Fellows and LIFE scholarship recipients at our member institutions who are majoring in approved education or accounting programs can be eligible for a \$2,500 scholarship enhancement each year starting with their sophomore year.

Please continue your prayers for our member colleges and universities that were impacted by Hurricane Helene. More than half of our member campuses sustained damages from the storm, and as of yesterday, classes have resumed at all schools ravaged by the storm. SCICU member colleges and universities are strong and resilient, and your continued support to these 21 institutions is now more important than ever.

Third annual Joint Higher Education Day held at S.C. State House April 9, 2024

Students from SCICU member institutions, public colleges and universities, and the technical colleges once again combined forces and held the Joint Higher Education Day on April 9, 2024..


Educational and Economic Impact of Independent Colleges and Universities

SCICU represents 21 independent colleges and universities, each with a unique historical and cultural background. Many also have a strong faith-based emphasis. SCICU's member institutions currently include five historically black colleges and universities and two previously all-women's colleges that are now co-educational.

SCICU member colleges and universities:

- Enrolled **36,185** total students (Fall 2022)
 - o **30,874** undergraduate students (23% of S.C.'s total undergraduate enrollment at four-year institutions)
 - o **65%** of undergraduate students are S.C. residents
 - o 47% identify as minority
 - o 6,103 graduate students
- Provided \$363 million in institutional aid to undergraduate students (AY 2022-23)


- Awarded 5,700 bachelor's degrees (22% of S.C.'s bachelor's degrees) and 2,037 graduate degrees during AY 2022-2023
- Employed more than 8,400 faculty and staff and several thousand student workers (Fall 2023)
- Contributed more than \$1 billion in business expenses and payroll to South Carolina's economy (AY 2022-2023)

- SCICU institutions invest substantially in the success of students. At \$363.4 million, or 53.4% of all
 financial aid, institutional scholarships and grants are the largest single source of student financial aid.
- Nearly four-fifths of the SCICU average student financial aid package does not require repayment
 by students. Federal grants/work study, state merit scholarships, tuition grants, and institutional
 scholarships collectively account for 78.7% of student financial aid for students attending SCICU member
 colleges and universities.

FINANCIAL CONDITION: September 1, 2023 - August 31, 2024

The financial statements of SCICU are audited by The Hobbs Group, P.A. which has issued its unmodified opinion. The following is drawn from their 2024 audit. Total assets of \$5,437,274 on August 31, 2024 compares to \$4,898,954 on August 31, 2023.

Because our member colleges and universities are assessed dues to underwrite the entire administration and operating costs of this non-profit organization, 100 percent of all contributions raised from donors are distributed to the members for scholarships without any reductions for fund-raising costs. Gifts and awards totaling \$673,985 were distributed during the fiscal year.
